Laura's Star (Lauras Stern)

Synopsis:

Laura misses her old home very much after moving to the big city. She finds it difficult to make new friends and wants to go back to the house she refers to as 'home'. One evening, when she observes a small star falling from the sky and then finds it with a broken point, she comforts it and treats it caringly with a plaster. Together, she and the star experience magical adventures that make Laura's most imaginative dreams come true – and with the help of the star, she finally settles into her new home.

For over 20 years, *Laura's Star* has been one of Germany's biggest children's brands. The timeless character based on Klaus Baumgart's book now returns to the screens – 15 years after Thilo Graf Rothkirch and Maya Gräfin Rothkirch's animated film drew a whole generation of young fans to the cinema for the first time. This time round, the enchanting story about friendship, care and trust is told as a live-action film, charmingly and sensitively interpreted by up-and-coming director Joya Thome and produced by Christian Becker and Maya Gräfin Rothkirch. The film introduces very young viewers to important topics in an interesting, amusing and touching way.

Underlying themes:

This is a beautiful film that portrays the issues surrounding moving home and settling into a new area. The film has been shot in a lovely setting with beautiful, vivid colours which give it a real 'feel-good' factor. Children will find the film engaging and I don't think they will have an issue following the storyline as all the screenings in DCA Cinema will have a reader reading the subtitles out loud to assist them. There are many ways in which this film can be used in the classroom and I have included a range of activities to explore friendships, writing, art and numeracy. Most of these are aimed at around P1/2 but could be adapted to suit other age groups.

The resources in this pack are aimed at Early and First Levels of CfE. The activities focus on discussion, sequencing, writing, numeracy and health & wellbeing.

Before watching the film

Discussion

You will need: the film poster in Appendix 1 for showing to the whole class, the film trailer without subtitles: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=8Nmmdgf8RCY

Look at the poster for the film in Appendix 1 on the Interactive Whiteboard. Discuss as a class what they think the film will be about. What do they think 'Stern' might mean? Is it similar to any word we know?

Read the questions below to see where to pause the trailer as you watch it. If the link above doesn't work, then search YouTube for "Lauras Stern – Trailer #1 Deutsch German (2021)." The trailer is in German with no subtitles. This will allow the children to use visual clues to determine what they think the film is about. Tell the children that they are going to be detectives while watching the film trailer. Their mission is to look for useful information. This could be things such as what the characters are doing, their facial expressions or music.

PAUSE THE TRAILER AT 16 SECONDS:

- Who is the main character?
- How do you think she is feeling? How do you know this?
- What other characters have we met?

PAUSE THE TRAILER AT 1 MIN 17 SECS:

- How is she feeling now? How do we know?
- Why do you think her feelings have changed?

WATCH THE REST OF THE TRAILER:

- Why do you think the star was at the window?
- Why do you think the star stopped glowing?
- What do you think will happen to the star?
- What do you think will happen to the girl?
- What kind of colours are in the trailer? What does this tell us about what kind of film it might be? Does it remind you of something you have watched? Would it be different if it was all dull colours?
- What language do you think they are speaking?
- What do you think the word 'Stern' means in English?

After watching the film



Activity 1: Literacy - Sequencing/Writing

You will need: copies of the images in Appendix 2 and copies of the sentences in Appendices 3/4/5/6 depending on the age & ability of pupils.

Pupils should work in pairs. Print the images in Appendix 2 for each pair of children. They should sequence the images and discuss with their partner what is happening in each one. Pupils can then either:

- Glue each image into their jotter and write a sentence underneath to explain what is happening in the image.
- Match the sentences in Appendix 3 to the images.
- Have the sentences in Appendix 4 cut, ready for pupils to rearrange to form the sentence.
- Colour in the key words in Appendix 5 and match to some of the stills in appendix 2.
- Appendix 6 is a sheet with the words in dots that can be used for writing practice.

Activity 2: Literacy - Circle Time Discussions

In a circle, use the following activities for discussion.

- Think of the word "star". What sound can you hear at the start? What other words can you think of that start with the/s/sound?
- "Laura's star is..." Each child adds a word to describe the star. Go round the circle with each child saying "Laura's star is (all the words said so far and then add a new word)".
- What makes a good friend? Go round the circle and ask each child what they think makes a good friend. What do they like about their friends?
- Starting something new. In the film, Laura has moved to a new house and doesn't have any
 friends. Can the children relate to this? Encourage each pupil to share a time when they
 have started something new, perhaps school or a club, or moved house. Alternatively,
 they could share how they felt at a time when they didn't have a friend/anyone to play with.
 What could they do in this situation?

Activity 3: Art - Create a Star

You will need: a copy of Appendix 7 for each pupil, a range of shiny, sparkly materials.

Using the star in Appendix 7, pupils decorate their star using shiny, glittery materials. Either cut the star out or leave on the A4 paper to allow older pupils to write words around the star to describe it.

Activity 4: Numeracy - Pattern

You will need: a copy of Appendix 8 for each pupil. Discuss patterns with pupils. Give them a copy of Appendix 8 and ask them to continue the star patterns. They can create their own patterns on the bottom two rows.

Activity 5: Numeracy - Counting

You will need: a copy of Appendix 9 for each pupil. Pupils count how many points are on each star shape and write the number in the middle of the star. They then colour the star with the least points red and the star with the most points green.

Activity 6: Literacy - Writing

Pupils should use the film as a stimulus for writing. They could structure their writing in different ways depending on age and ability:

- I went on a... (train, plane, bus etc) to... (place).
- Write a letter to Laura telling her not to worry about settling in to a new home and giving her some advice on making new friends.
- A good friend is... (continue sentence and draw a picture).
- I feel sad when... I feel happy when... (continue sentence and draw a picture).

Activity 7: Art – Junk Modelling/Literacy – Story Writing

You will need: junk for creating models, glue, paint, glitter etc (optional). In the film, both Laura and her friend have rockets they have made that they use to imagine going on exciting adventures. Children should collect junk and create their own models. They can discuss what adventures their model would take them on. Older pupils could also write a story about their adventure.

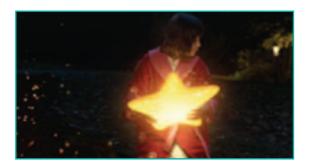

Appendix 2: Learning Intention: to sequence a story



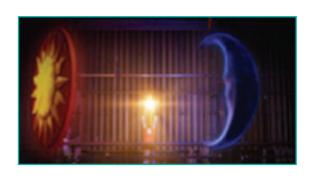
