A word of advice: if there is a film or event you are interested in but unsure of exact numbers or getting permission slips in etc please at least register via the above process to make sure we are aware of your interest. We can only work with the bids for places we are aware of, and build the schedule based on those. Silent birds definitely don't get any worms...!

The Process

Before you get started it is a good idea to liaise with your IT support team to ensure the website is not 'firewalled' by your school's security software.

To watch the films online, please head to **athome.dca.org.uk** and, if this is your first visit, create an account. A DCA at Home account is required to watch any of our films online but **creating an account is totally free**.

You will only be asked for payment when you want to watch a film. Once you have created an account, you can then rent either a single short film or the bundle of shorts – all single rentals will be for 72 hours. Renting the bundle of all the films can either be for 72 hours or the period 21 October to 10 November 2023.

Browse the Discovery Film Festival collection and select a film or the bundle of short films.

Click on the image to go to that film or bundle of films' page, where you can view the prices, and click Rent. Alternatively you can hover over the image to view the prices and click through from the browsing page.

Enter your payment details and click Rent.

Either click Play Now to watch immediately, or close the message and return to My Library later to watch the film.

Rented films will remain in your library for 14 days before you watch them – this is called the Rental Window. Once you click Play Now you will have 72 hours to watch your film – this is called the Watch Window. You can watch the film as many times as you like during this 72 hour period.

Please note: all online access to all films will be terminated at midnight on Fri 10 November 2023 regardless of when your rental starts.

Please note: each account allows you to log in and watch the films on a variety of different devices but only on one device at a time. Simultaneous screenings from one account are not possible. If a school is planning to view several films from one account these cannot be at the same time.

Extending your class experience





For those schools who would like to come and join us in the cinema, we offer a range of add-on activities to extend the experience. There are several ways of maximising the impact for your class, and we would like to tailor each opportunity to the needs of the class in question; the following are just some suggestions. When you make your request to attend DCA, we will have an individual conversation about the timing and exact content of your trip, and discuss what additional options you might have in mind. All of these opportunities will be subject to group size, available space and staffing requirements but we hope to be able to fulfil as many requests as possible.

Gallery Visit

A visit to DCA Galleries to see our exhibition by **Rachel Eulena Williams** (more information on pages 30-31).

Film introductions/ post-screening discussion

An opportunity to hear more detail about the film you are about to see, or have just seen, with a member of our festival team. For those students who are studying Modern Languages, this could be held in the target language and offer some speaking/listening opportunities.

Film Education Workshop

Exploring key aspects of the film/s you have watched/are going to watch such as characters, setting, story and camera shots supported by the BFI Film Education framework of three Cs and Ss, and Discovery teacher resources.

Modern Languages Study Morning

Practice those pre- and post-screening language skills with some film-related speaking and listening activities, based around the film of your choice. Led by one of the ML teachers who have written our supporting resource packs, this will be a structured opportunity for your group to discuss and share their thoughts on the issues raised in the film screening.

Shorts for Wee Ones or Middle Ones Creative Making Workshop

A creative making session based on characters, sound and/or colour from the films

'Being a Visual Detective' Session

View our exhibition in the galleries and explore artworks using a forensic investigation analogy led by one of our team who can pitch the language and activity to your age range (NB: maximum group size 32, divided into smaller groups).

Media Workshop

For any groups studying film or media, here's an opportunity to hear about film exhibition, using a selection of the trailers for the festival programme and how they each seek out their own particular audience.

Spaces to eat lunch

Spaces for groups to eat snacks or lunch are available but on a limited basis depending on group size and availability. Please make sure you tell us at the time of your film bid if you would like the use of a space for your group either before or after your film and/or workshop.

We're sure you'll also have your own ideas of how the films can be used with your class or of course, you may simply want them to enjoy a stimulating cultural experience. Film is one of our most valued art forms, and watching together in a shared space allows children to experience the "energy and excitement of being part of an audience for other people's presentations/performances." (EXA 0,1,2,4-01a and EXA 3-01b).

We find that pupils are highly motivated and engaged when working with film. CfE recognises the importance of a quality learning experience and "achieving active engagement, motivation and depth of learning". The shared experience of viewing a stimulating film provides teachers with an excellent basis for promoting productive discussions and engaged, higher order thinking.

Comments from visiting teachers

Why do you engage with Discovery Film Festival?

We went to the cinema as I think it is a special experience for kids to see films on the big screen. We also watched some again in class after our visit.

I have taken classes in the past and it has always been a hit.

DCA is such a lovely cinema I was keen for the children to experience the films in a cinema setting.

I chose the shorts (SMO) because it gave me a range of topics to look at and exposed pupils to a huge variety of film making genres.

To view a foreign language film for interest and enjoyment, to help improve language skills and to learn about other countries and cultures. We always tell pupils that the films are specially selected and that we've seen some fantastic films over the years.

When asked about the film, the pupils were pleasantly surprised (as were we!) as to how good it was in spite of it being subtitled. They were also very impressed with the venue, loved how clean it was, how comfy the seats were and how great the sound system was.

We attended the in-cinema event for Zero Gravity. We wanted to attend to give our pupils another experience to attend another location in Dundee (as we are from the north of the city and many of our pupils had not been to DCA previously).

Good for getting the children out on a school trip after being restricted by covid for such a long time. We looked at the online films as a follow up activity after we visited the cinema this year. I think it is better to visit in person and it also helps to give the children an awareness of what their city has to offer.



Shorts for Wee Ones 2023

Always a popular feature of any Discovery Film Festival, this collection of seven short films for our youngest viewers is sure to delight and amuse. A variety of stories and styles have once again been gathered from around the world – this year featuring films from Germany, France, Latvia, Belgium, Estonia and The Netherlands.

A sunflower learns of a whole new nocturnal world, two sisters play together and grow closer over the years and a little fish discovers new friends (and an enemy) in a tidal rockpool. A giant rock makes new friends in a village it crashes into, and we learn of a very different perspective on the traditional Enormous Turnip tale.

All these short films are in English or dialogue free – though one features a gentle lullaby with Latvian lyrics.

These magical tales will delight children age 3+ and are a colourful introduction to the cinema experience as well as moving image literacy. Discovery Favourite (2019): A Minuscule Adventure

Way back in Discovery Film Festival 2016, one of the big hits with school audiences was a then unknown film called *Minuscule: Valley Of The Lost Ants*, an epic saga featuring an ant, a ladybird, a spider and a large tin of sugar cubes. It was ninety minutes of animated excitement, all presented without a single line of dialogue. Then, three years later, the ant, the ladybird and the spider were back in Discovery 2019 with a brand-new adventure – though this time they were all on the other side of the world...

As the first snow of the winter begins to fall, the minuscule denizens of the valley press on with the vital work of gathering food reserves for the long, dark months ahead. After some early successes, an encounter with another large tin of sugar cubes ends with our ladybird friend trapped in a large cardboard box and being shipped to ... Guadeloupe! What to do? Nothing for it but to get the mini-bugs team back together and set out on a dangerous rescue mission all the way to the Caribbean! New world, new encounters, new dangers ... But will they get there in time?

With its fantastic characterisation, spectacular music score, glorious sound effects and ingenious blend of animation and live action, this latest language-free bug-filled adventure will once again have a broad appeal across the ages.

Dounia And The Princess Of Aleppo

DOUNIA ET LA PRINCESSE D'ALEP

A few lucky nigella seeds tucked in the palm of her hand, and with the assistance of the magical Princess Of Aleppo, six-year-old Dounia leaves Syria and sets off towards a whole new world.

This is a magical tale of a very difficult journey, as Dounia and her grandparents are forced to flee from their war-torn city of Aleppo and become refugees looking for a new place to call home. Their idyllic life – full of family, friends and neighbours enjoying shopping in the souk, preparing amazing foods and making fantastic music – is replaced with uncertainty, hardship and a seemingly never-ending quest for safety. But along the way new friendships will be formed, assistance will come from the most unexpected sources and the Princess of Aleppo will be on hand to offer her magical protection.

Whilst telling the most serious of stories, the film finds plenty of opportunities for magic, fun and some truly dazzling visuals, and offers a very accessible way in for children (and adults) to explore some very contemporary issues and the importance of respect for all the citizens of this world we share.

Belle & Sebastian: Next Generation

BELLE ET SÉBASTIEN: NOUVELLE GÉNÉRATION

Ten-year-old Sebastian is perfectly at home with his urban lifestyle – skateboarding through the parks of Paris with his friends at every available opportunity. So when he is suddenly forced to spend the summer with his aunt and grandmother down in the Pyrenees, and swap his skateboarding for some sheep herding, he is less than thrilled. The scenery may indeed be stunning but the local kids ignore him, the sheep smell awful and the holidays seem endless. And that's when he meets Belle. Owned by his aunt's friend, she is a patou, a Pyrenean Mountain Dog, and extremely large and (at first) very unfriendly. But she and Sebastian are about to become firm friends and enjoy the summer of their lives...

Whether or not you are familiar with the books, the TV series and the recent run of films based on their adventures, the Belle and Sebastian stories are a safe and comforting 'one child and their pet' narrative, and one which has featured in several Discovery Film Festivals over the years. We're delighted to be able to present their latest outing, bringing with it some timely questions about the importance of preserving the countryside and the ever-growing threat of climate change. (And for those of you nervous about the fate of the dog, let's just say a sequel next year will be perfectly possible...).

Discovery Favourite (2015): Zarafa

Loosely based on the tale of the very first giraffe to set foot in France, Zarafa ('giraffe' in Arabic) is an epic journey from 19th century Sudan to Paris by way of Alexandria, Marseille and the Alps. Ten year-old Maki escapes from a cruel slave trader and meets friendly giraffe Zarafa. When Zarafa is sent to Paris as a gift for the French King, Maki sets out to rescue her. Along the way he meets Bedouin princes, feisty Mediterranean pirates, a pair of very resourceful cows and a hippopotamus with a problem.

This beautifully crafted hand-drawn animation takes the spirit of classic Disney and adds a splash of contemporary humour and social comment to give it an appeal for the broadest of audiences. Although only 78 minutes long, it feels truly epic in scale and proved exceptionally popular with families at the French box office. Occasionally sad, often hilarious, *Zarafa* was one of the highlights of our 2015 festival, and we're delighted to bring it back as a Discovery favourite for our 20th edition.

Happily enjoying small-town life, 12-year-old Mina has loving parents, a free-spirited and devoted grandmother and best friend Markus always by her side. What more could she possibly want? But when a famous hiphop dancer starts at her school and plans to set up a new dance crew to take part in a national competition, Mina's world turns upside down. With her head well and truly turned by the handsome E.D. Win, she signs up for an audition and plans her best moves to impress her new crush. One small problem: Mina can't dance. But with the help of her grandmother (once a dancer herself) and the ever-faithful Markus, can she attract E.D. Win's attention, get herself into the spotlight and maybe even win the competition?

It's a very familiar set-up for a classic coming-of-age story – can the seeming no-hoper learn new skills overnight and triumph against the odds? – but this is a delightful new version with outstanding performances from its young (and not-so-young) cast and a real script full of humour with one or two surprises along the way. Heartwarming and engaging, this is a *Rocky* for our times. Just in a middle school setting. And with dancing instead of fighting...

Titing

Italian airship engineer Umberto Nobile enjoys a quiet life with his beloved dog Titina, who charmed him into rescuing her from the streets of Rome. One day, Norwegian explorer superstar Roald Amundsen contacts him and orders an airship to conquer the North Pole. Nobile seizes the opportunity to go down in history. He brings Titina along, and the unlikely trio sets out on an expedition to the last undiscovered place on Earth. But will their differences get in the way of a successful mission?

Promising to be "more or less based on true events", *Titina* tells the entertaining and exciting story of an almost forgotten voyage of discovery, the conquest of the North Pole by airship in 1926. Amazingly, Titina was a real dog who led an extraordinary life, taking her from a harsh existence in Rome's back alleys to a lofty view over the North Pole, and there are moments of revelation when the beautiful animation suddenly gives way to actual archive footage featuring all three lead characters. It is an astonishing tale filled with suspense and humour, all accompanied by a captivating score, and a film that works on different levels to make it enjoyable for both children and adults. Inspired by true events, *Titina* is at once a compelling, accessible and ultimately very moving history lesson.

Discovery Favourite (2017): My Life As A Courgette

MA VIE DE COURGETTE

After accidentally causing the death of his alcoholic mother, ten-year-old Icare (who prefers the nickname 'Courgette') is taken to the local children's home by kindly policeman Raymond. Shy at first, Courgette soon gets to know the other resident boys and girls, each with their own sad story of how they ended up in the home. Gradually, thanks to the care and affection of the devoted staff, the friendship of the other resident children and the much-enjoyed visits by Raymond, Courgette begins to settle into his new life.

Working with a powerful script by Céline Sciamma (*Tomboy* and *Girlhood*), *My Life* as a *Courgette* tackles some difficult issues, but it also shows the life-changing power that kindness and support can have on a child with even the most difficult of starts. With their big eyes and authentic voices, these puppets have a powerful message to deliver – that a young life can be tough but it also can be beautifully resilient.

Kristjan and the other kids from the neighbourhood are best friends and spend their summer days on games and adventures in an abandoned old factory. After being chased away from the grounds by Elmar, the grumpy security guard, a freak accident casts a dark shadow over the group – and Kristjan must face the hardest decision of his young life. Will he dare to save a life against all odds? Or will his loyalty to his friends stand firm?

This contemporary reworking of a *Lord Of The Flies* narrative – what happens when children are left to fend for themselves and imaginative games become horrifyingly real – challenges the audience to think what they might do in a given situation where the pressures to conform are immense. The Fantastic Three

LES TROIS FANTASTIQUES

Max, a witty and brave 12-year-old, feels like he has two families instead of one. In and after school, he spends all his time with his two best friends Tom and Vivian, who are always there to make life easier for each other. Together, they are The Fantastic Three. His real family on the other hand, is messy, with a depressed single mother and a brother in jail.

When Max's brother returns home, more trouble arises. To save his brother from his own downfall, Max drags his friends with him into a seemingly inevitable spiral.

What starts as a high school-set 'coming of age' drama gradually descends into something much darker, and some might say this film resembles more of a Ken Loach family relationship drama than a traditional high school film. Life in a small town in the French countryside is a perfect backdrop to those tiny actions between friends (and foes) that will scar some people's lives forever. Once started, it's a hard cycle to break, and friendship may not always be sufficient to pull you through unscathed. Will The Fantastic Three make it?

Bullets

Most get to choose their own destiny. Others are not that lucky.

Twelve-year-old Abdel and his friends live on a housing estate where economic hardships don't get in the way of some serious fooling around and having fun. School is all part of the game, though the teacher recognises Abdel has potential and an interest in becoming a vet. Volunteering at a local farm shows Abdel what his future could hold. But then his friend Bashir gets in trouble and Abdel takes some serious risks to help him out of a very grim situation. Sadly what was intended to be a one-time action is not seen the same way by others and Abdel is again forced to carry out an assignment for the local criminal gang. This time the consequences are far more deadly...

The journey from happy-go-lucky child to a card-carrying gang member is presented with absolute clarity here, and shows how very small steps can quickly turn an entire life around. With powerful performances from all the cast, a very smart script and mounting tension enhanced by some terrific editing, this is an education for us all and a powerful warning against some of the pressures facing young people today.

The Worst Ones

LES PIRES

A film crew have arrived at a housing estate in the suburbs of Boulogne-Sur-Mer, in the north of France. During the process of casting the film, four teenagers, Lily, Ryan, Maylis and Jessy, are chosen to play leading roles. Everyone in the neighbourhood is surprised: why have they chosen what the community refer to as "the worst ones"?

Winner of the Un Certain Regard competition at the Cannes Film Festival in 2022, this is an unflinching look at the filmmaking process – and how there can be both winners and losers when the circus rolls into town. Beautifully photographed and tightly edited, *The Worst Ones* offers a provocative assessment of how the filmmaking process can take advantage of those, and especially the young, who fall under its spell.

Discovery Favourite (2010): Boy

1984. Boy is a dreamer who loves Michael Jackson. He lives with his brother Rocky, a tribe of deserted cousins and his Nan. Boy's other hero, his father Alamein, is the subject of Boy's fantasies, and he imagines him as a deep-sea diver, a war hero and a close relation of Michael Jackson. In reality, Alamein is an inept, wannabe gangster who has been in jail for robbery. When Alamein returns home after seven years away, Boy is forced to confront the man he thought he remembered, find his own potential and learn to get along without the hero he had been hoping for.

Boy was filmed in Waihau Bay in the Bay of Plenty, where director Taika Waititi grew up. The film is inspired by "true and imagined memories". Says Waititi, "Part of what makes this film distinct is the humour; I want to explore the painful comedy of growing up and interpreting the world. I believe that despite our faults and inadequacies, through all pain and heartache, there is still room to laugh. I think that's what makes my films different, the feeling that although there is often darkness, there are also little bits of light to encourage hope and hold on to possibility."

Rinoceronte

Most of the time, eleven-year-old Damián takes care of himself. His family is negligent and occasionally violent, and as a result he stays out of their way as much as he can. After one incident, he is picked up by the police and placed in the care of social worker Leandro, who takes him to a local children's home. Despite the best intentions of Leandro and the care home's committed staff, Damián desperately wants to go back home. It's up to Leandro – who we learn has a very similar past – to show Damián that his previous life is now behind him, and that even with the rage he feels, it is possible for him to build himself a new future.

The film presents a world view from someone whose voice is not often heard, and asks us to watch and listen carefully. The central character of Damián speaks so rarely and with so few words but is so expressive in his body language and reaction that he speaks volumes about the difficulties (and occasional joys) of his situation. It may ask a lot of its audience but this is a powerful film which takes us onto the streets of urban Argentina and presents an important reminder that not all young people's lives are the same.

Discovery Exhibition 2023

Rachel Eulena Williams Hair and Body

Sat 26 August - Sun 19 November

This major new exhibition by New York-based artist Rachel Eulena Williams will debut a new body of work expanding upon Williams' exuberant use of colour, radical approach to materials and the playfulness and vitality of her practice.

This exhibition will mark Williams' first major solo exhibition in a UK public institution, showcasing a new body of work across painting, sculpture and installation. Her work upends traditional approaches to colour and form by expanding her ideas beyond the canvas rectangle; incorporating print, assemblage and bricolage to create multidimensional and layered shapes which seep and blend into their surroundings.

The show will be Williams' largest exhibition in the UK to date, having garnered international recognition in spaces such as PACE gallery, New York; 68 projects, Berlin; Loyal Gallery, Stockholm: and Cooper Cole, Toronto, Over her career, Williams' work has constantly shifted and evolved moving ever more into the third dimension, beginning with line drawings which became mid-scale paintings before developing into multimedia assemblages consisting of materials which defy their common use. Having mainly produced medium scale artworks over the past several years, Williams will take full advantage of DCA's light and expansive spaces to play with scale and create considerable installations to fill the largest of the two galleries.

In Gallery 1, Williams will showcase canvas-based works which blur the line between sculpture and painting. These utilise every inch of negative space, even the overlooked back of the canvas, which is painted in a solid hue to cast coloured shadow on the wall, incorporating the building itself into the work

These exercises in bending and blurring borders will develop further by incorporating the walls of Gallery 2 into a work mirroring the artist's deconstructed canvasses. Central to the installation will be a new commission consisting of Williams' signature bold colours, strips of canvas and rope suspended from the ceiling to create a playful swing-like structure.

About the artist:

Williams received a B.F.A. from Cooper Union for the Advancement of Science and Art, New York in 2013. Her work has been exhibited internationally at PACE Gallery, New York (2021), Canada Gallery, New York (2020), Loyal Gallery, Stockholm (2019), Ceysson & Bénétière, Sainte Etienne (2018), Night Gallery, Los Angeles (2018), Derek Eller Gallery, New York (2018), Cooper Cole, Toronto (2018), The Journal Gallery, Brooklyn, NY (2017), Mass Gallery, Austin (2017), SomeTime Salon, San Francisco (2017), and Center Street. New York (2017).

Williams has held the SIP Fellowship at the Robert Blackburn Printmaking Workshop, New York (2019), 68 Projects, Berlin (2018; 2020), and NY Studio Factory, Brooklyn (2014).

Subtitles

We have noted where a film is in a foreign language and is subtitled in English. We encourage those able to read to enjoy the subtitles and find this to be possible for the majority of children aged 8+. For individual students aged 8+ who are likely to have difficulties, we would encourage schools to take advantage of free tickets for all adult support, and plan seating arrangements accordingly.
